Tone 1. Troparion of the resurrection

When the stone had been sealed by the Jews, while the soldiers were guarding Your most pure body, You rose on the third day, O Savior, granting life to the world. The powers of heaven therefore cried to You, O Giver of Life: "Glory to Your Resurrection, O Christ! Glory to Your Kingdom! Glory to Your dispensation, O Lover of mankind!"

Tone 2. Troparion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy

We venerate Your most pure image, O Good One; and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O Christ our God. Of Your own will You were pleased to ascend the Cross in the flesh and deliver Your creatures from bondage to the Enemy. Therefore with thankfulness we cry aloud to You: "You have filled all

with joy, O our Savior, for you alone came to save the world."

Tone 1. Kontakion of the resurrection

As God, You rose from the tomb in glory, raising the world with Yourself. Human nature praises You as God, for death has vanished. Adam exults, O Master! Eve rejoices, for she is freed from bondage and cries to You: "You are the Giver of Resurrection to all, O Christ!"

Tone 8. Kontakion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy

No one could describe the Word of the Father; but when He took flesh from you, O Theotokos, He accepted to be described, and restored the fallen image to its former state by uniting it to divine beauty. We confess and proclaim our salvation in words and images.

Tone 4. Prokeimenon

Blessed are You, O Lord God of our fathers, and praised and glorified is Your Name forever!

For You are just in all that You have done for us!

Tone 4. Alliluias

Quote of the Week

As we said, it is not difficult to know what your passion is. Pay attention to where your mind goes. Either it will go to your passion, or to Christ, or to something else. It is not possible for the human mind to be "nowhere." It has to grab on to something, latch on to something, and this "something" is what gives it a feeling of fullness and satisfaction, and this will either be God or something other than God.

St. Maximos is not engaging in psychoanalysis, but is offering a deep, spiritual diagnosis of the state of our being; a laying bare of the depths of the soul. He strips us naked so that we might see all that is ugly and ill-formed within us. If we want to, we can correct ourselves, we can change our minds. If, on the other hand, we don't want to do this, if we don't want to disdain and despise the things that keep us down and hold us back, we will remain in the grip of the passions for all eternity, which means we will be adulterers for all eternity, or rather adulterated for all eternity. We will be separated eternally from God, having embraced an idol in the place of the Lord.
