Tone 8. Troparion of the saint

O light of Orthodoxy, teacher of the Church, its confirmation, O ideal of monks and invincible champion of theologians, O wonderworking Gregory, glory of Thessalonica and preacher of grace, always intercede before the Lord that our souls may be saved!

Tone 2. Kontakion of the resurrection

Quote of the Week

When St. Maximos the Confessor speaks about love, he gives us the opportunity to understand how easy it is to love God. All we need to do is pay attention to where our mind goes. If it doesn't go to God, we need to realize that our mind does not see clearly, and has need of a physician who can perform

the right kind of surgery in order to correct our vision.

When a person is born, it is natural for him to see people singly and whole, and not double; to see things clearly and correctly, not as slanted or twisted, which is not natural. It is natural to see things clearly and correctly. What is natural, simple, and easy, and makes us healthy and happy, is the love of God, which is as natural as the eyes seeing and the mouth speaking. The mouth is not able to walk, but has been made to speak. The hand is for holding, embracing, giving alms, and to make the sign of the cross. These are their natural functions and they are all very easy. If you try to walk on your hands, it will be difficult and uncomfortable, since this is not what they were made for. In the same way, it is natural for the mind to be turned to and focused on the love of God, because it is toward God that the human mind naturally tends. Just as our eyes naturally open to the light, so too does our mind open naturally to God, who is the creator of light.

The absence of love is a sickness, while the presence of love is health. Whenever someone wants to, he can love God genuinely and become the spouse of God. What more could a person desire?
